I wanted to let you know how much your article touched me about HM2 Jared White. You see, Jared was my friend, and my co-worker, and I was there at the airport the night he came home to my hometown of Tulsa. Never have I been more proud to be an American Airlines family member.

Though nobody knew Jared here, he was a hero. He had gone to Iraq 3 times, all before the age of 22. He had saved so many lives, but was always hard on himself that he had not saved more. When most kids at the age of 19 are away to college, he was earning his first purple heart. Jared served with me at the Naval Hospital in Rota Spain,

where he won the highest honor we could place on him which was Sailor of the Year. He was a man who bled red, white and blue. In fact, his nickname was J.A. Red, he was frequently teased for being "Joe Freakin Navy," and his favorite song literally was "Proud to be an American". Every single day at work Jared would burst through the door and sing the song "Green Acres". He was just 25 years old when he passed away, and on his casket was the Navy Emblem. Jared was so blessed to be buried at the foot of his beloved Navy flag at the cemetery that we laid him to rest at yesterday afternoon.

I am writing this letter to you, because I want you to know how extremely touched that in our time of grieving for our friend, your team of Patriot Guards was there. I could not believe that outside in the freezing cold, with slick streets everywhere, when we came out of the gate with him in the white hearse, there was so many people lined up with flags...just to show their support. I was so emotional from seeing my friend draped in our flag, that when I saw this kind act, I began to cry. One of the gentlemen standing watch on the flag line saw me and came over to me and wrapped me in a huge hug and just held me, all the while saying "I am so sorry for your loss, thank you so much for your service too. God bless you Ma'am." So, I am going to attach a photo of this gentleman, whom I never got the chance to thank in hopes that you could pass along my heartfelt thank you to him.

I am also going to attach a few photos of our hero Jared P. White, so you can see what we all saw every single day. Thank you again for everything that you and your team here did for us that cold, wet, sad night. God bless you, and God bless every single person who took the time (and sacrificed the warmth for a while) to be there for us, his loving family and friends. American Airlines Considers Adding Jobs at Tulsa Maintenance Center

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American Airlines is considering an employment expansion at its Maintenance & Engineering Center at Tulsa International Airport, but its plans aren't solid and could change if fuel prices and the economy worsen, airline officials said Wednesday.

American spokeswoman Missy Latham responded to rumors circulating among Transport Workers Union mechanics that the company could add workers to meet increased passenger traffic and an improving airline sector.

"We expect to have the opportunity to recall and hire employees in our Maintenance and Engineering operation in 2011," Latham said. "Details of the locations and numbers of positions are still being finalized, and we'll share more information when it is available."

The M&E Center, which employs 7,000 people, is American's largest maintenance base.

In Fort Worth, American has 1,900 employees at its Alliance Airport maintenance base.

An American spokesman, who declined to be identified, said adding jobs in Tulsa is "a possibility, but there are a lot of variables."

"American Airlines lost \$97 million (in the fourth quarter), and fuel prices continue to rise," the spokesman said, "so three months from now it may not be a reality.

"If the economy does a double-dip or oil prices go through the roof, everything could change."
